





Section-A shall include **five (5) compulsory, short answer type questions** consisting of at least **one question** from each unit. Each question in the section shall be of 3 marks and the student shall write the answers in 70-80 words.

3x5=15

Section –B shall consist **five (5) compulsory medium answer type questions** consisting of at least **one question** from each unit. Each question in the section shall be of 7 marks and the student shall write the answers in 250-300 words.

7x5=35

Section –C shall consist of **four (4) long answer type questions** consisting of at least **one question** from each unit. Student shall attempt two out of these four questions and the student shall write the answer in 500-600 words.

2x15=30
